

UK-Ireland Collaboration in the Digital Humanities Main Research Call

Eligibility rules for Irish participants

Consortium participants: roles and terminology

For all submitted proposals, the Irish team **must** feature an Irish co-PI.

Additionally, the following consortium participants can be included:

- Irish Co-Investigator(s) [Co-I]
- Irish project partners

By Irish co-I(s), we refer to additional project participant(s) based in HEIs or RPOs, eligible for IRC funding (http://research.ie/funding/eligible-higher-education-institutions-and-research-performing-organisations/), involved in the project. The Irish co-Is can be based in the same HEI/RPO as the Irish co-PI, a different one or a mix (in the case of multiple co-Is). By project partners, we mean non-academic partners involved in the consortium (e.g. creative industries; NGOs; industry representatives). All project participants should explain, through the proposal, how they bring extra-value to the project (e.g. benefits in kind, additional expertise, networking opportunities...).

Eligibility of the Irish co-PI

Contract of sufficient duration	A researcher (of postdoctoral level of higher) who holds a contract of sufficient duration with an eligible HEI or RPO to carry out the proposed research from the project start date until the project end date.
Current PI in other PI-led projects (either	In the event of an applicant, who is already a PI in another project, being successful in this call, at award acceptance stage they will be asked to submit a time-management strategy, to be approved by the Irish Research Council before the award's commencement.

Disciplinary remit	The Irish co-PI and Co-I(s) can be active in all disciplinary areas as per the Irish Research Council's pan-disciplinary mandate, provided that the consortium's scope falls within the Digital Humanities field.

Eligibility of Irish Co-I(s)

Seniority	Researchers (of postdoctoral level or higher), based in any eligible
level and	HEI/RPO (including the Irish co-PI's one). When adding Irish co-I(s) to the
contract of	consortium, their relevance and contribution to the project is to be made
sufficient	clear. Should the Co-I(s) hold a contract of shorter duration than the project,
duration	this should be addressed at proposal stage.
Disciplinary	The Irish co-PI and Co-I(s) can be active in all disciplinary areas as per the
remit	Irish Research Council's pan-disciplinary mandate, provided that the
	consortium's scope falls within the Digital Humanities field.

Eligibility of Irish partners

As clearly stated in the call specification document, with reference to Irish project partners, non-academic partners, such as museums, cultural institutions, private companies and NGOs (non-exclusive list) are eligible. Non-academic partners outside Ireland will be considered. In any case, the added value of non-academic partners to the project must be clearly justified.
